The Loss of a Leader

On December 20th we lost one of our historic "firsts." Retired Master Sergeant Catherine G. Murray, 100, passed away with dignity and peace at her home in Ft Lauderdale. She was buried in Arlington National Cemetery on January 23rd.

MSgt Murray was the first woman Marine to retire with 20 years of service. She was also the first enlisted woman

Marine to transfer to the Fleet Marine Corps Reserves in 1962. She enlisted in March of 1943 and attained the rank of master sergeant in 1950. She began her Marine Corps career driving a 5-ton truck during WWII and ended it with a nationwide broadcast announcement of her retirement by Walter Cronkite. Not many of us can say that! When she retired, she was fourth on the women's seniority list.

During her she service, received the Good Con-Medal duct (six awards), American Campaign Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, WWII Victory Medal, and National

Defense Service Medal.

She started her training at Hunter College and then Camp Lejeune. For three years afterward she drove sedans and trucks. In 1945 she was assigned to Hawaii where she served as a driver until the end of the war. MSgt Murray was retained on active duty when the war ended. During her career, Catherine served in 15 duty stations. While at Quantico, she was instrumental in planning and writing many of the military exams used by women Marines.

Greetings Marines!

Just a reminder...all mail that concerns WMA business should be mailed to: Women Marines Association, PO Box 377, Oaks, PA 19456-0377. Please do not mail official WMA mail to my residence. <u>Mailing to my residence delays processing!</u> Additionally, all checks should be addressed to either the Women Marines Association or WMA.

WMA has internal control and budget processes. WMA's financial records are examined by a CPA consulting firm and are reviewed/audited by a financial auditing firm. Our admin contractor prepares monthly and quarterly financial statements, which includes balance sheets and income statements, the same as major corporate and non-profit entities.

A process is in place to ensure that fraudulent activity does not take place. The bills are reviewed by the Admin Contractor and myself for correctness and forwarded to the 3rd Vice President for approval. Reimbursements are forwarded to the 3rd Vice President for approval and then they are returned to me and the Admin Contractor, where we examine for proper receipts, accuracy and correctness. If incorrect, I then forward back to the 3rd Vice President for re-approval. Upon approval, checks are cut and forwarded to me and the 1st Vice President or the President. Each check requires two signatures. On the very rare occasion when we utilize the WMA credit card, two members of the Executive Board of Directors must approve the use, and they can't be involved in the transaction. For example, if the 2nd Vice President needs to purchase supplies, the 3rd and the 1st Vice President are the credit card approvers.

WMA participates in a yearly budget process, which covers a two-year period. The 3rd Vice President is responsible for creating the two-year budget. The budget is scrutinized by the Board of Directors, taking into account the requirements of their respective Standing Committees, Appointed Representatives, and Special Appointments. Once this is completed, the Board of Directors will vote on the yearly spending plan. Any deviations in spending must be returned to the Board of Directors for their approval, usually via ballot vote. Mid-year we review the budget, using the Budget Allocation Summary, to see if we are "on track" or the Board of Directors can decide not to spend funds and "reallocate" them to another use.

Please remember to mail official WMA business to the address listed at the beginning of this article, ensuring that checks are completed correctly. Our internal review and budgeting processes establish a sound financial management program for our organization and prepare us for long term financial sustainability. These make effective and efficient use of our resources, as we are accountable to you, our donors and members. Thank you.

Retired Marine Receives Award

Retired Marine Carmen Lucas is a Kwaaymii Laguna Indian from San Diego County and has been a student of her Indian heritage throughout her life. She learned about cultural landscapes and ancestral human remains from her father, the late Tom Lucas, a well-known San Diego Indian, and has learned about essence of place and intangible cultural resources from working on her homeland and burial grounds at the former Laguna Indian Reservation, now Lucas Ranch, as the caretaker for over the last forty years.

She has worked in the field of Cultural Resource Management (CRM) as a Native American Monitor, Consultant, and

Educator for nearly thirty years, bringing a tribal perspective to cultural resource surveys and other efforts. Carmen has helped archaeologists in sifting dirt and identifying fragmented human remains as well as archaeological deposits. She is a strong advocate for the increased use of noninvasive technology in identifying resources, including the use of historic human remains detection canines.

Carmen helped to write and *Carmen Lucas* successfully nominate at least

four historic properties to the National Register of Historic Places, based on their tribal cultural values: Ah-ha Kwe-ahmac' (Cuyamaca Village), Wiipuk uun' yaw Trail (Cottonwood Trail), The Kwaaymii Homeland, and University House at the University of California, San Diego, the rehabilitation of which won the 2015 Governor's Historic Preservation Award. Her comments and participation in consultation, at both the planning and individual project levels, has led to the protection of tribally-significant properties, such as the Padre Dam property in San Diego County which has been protected from development and repatriated to the Kumeyaay Diegueño Land Conservancy for protection in perpetuity. Carmen's efforts also helped result in the adoption of innovative mitigation measures which have served as constructive precedent elsewhere in the state.

She provides Cultural Resources Sensitivity Training on utility and other projects for all workers who will be in the field to help them identify resources of concern, and is a frequent presenter at local reservations to train new classes of tribal monitors.

One of Carmen's greatest joys is walking the land with tribal youth from local reservations, sharing her passion for the ancestors and their lifestyles. At 81 years of age, she continues to be an inspiration to all who work to preserve California's treasured heritage.

Because of all the above, Carmen was one of eight recip-



ients of the 2017 Governor's Historic Preservation Award from the Office of Historic Preservation and California State Parks on November 2. Established in 1986, the Gov-

Awards are presented annually to projects, individuals, and organizations whose contributions demonstrate significant achievements in preserving the heritage of California.

Her contributions far outnumber the amount of space we have to publish it! But along with her preservation efforts, Carmen has also served two terms on the Board of the San Diego Archaeological Center, and served through appointment by the County of San Diego Board of Supervisors to the County Historic Sites Board.

Retiring in 1974 as a chief warrant officer, Carmen continues to take college-level classes at Kumeyaay Community College on the Sycuan Indian Reservation in San Diego. She continues to inspire future generations with her participation and insight. One of her greatest joys is walking the land with tribal youth from local reservations and sharing her passion for the ancestors and their lifestyles.

Congratulations, Carmen!

Elections

So here we are in the New Year with the 2018 Convention just around the corner. We all look forward to celebrating 100 years of women's service in the Marine Corps. WMA has been in existence for more than half of those 100 years and exemplifies the very code of conduct that we uphold as Marines. Your membership support at all levels is key in promoting its values and ensuring its future.

ELECTION BALLOT PROCESS

For your information, after 15 March the Nominating Committee will publish an election ballot for those positions having two or more nominees (considered "contested"). A ballot for any "contested" National Officer position will be sent to all WMA members and a ballot for each "contested" Area Director position will be sent to just those members within each area. In other words, all WMA members vote for National Officers and only members within the area where they live vote for their specific Area Director. E.G., I live in Virginia, within Area 2, so I only vote for the Area 2 Director.

One last note for clarification, if we do not have any contested positions, only one member running for each position, we will not publish a ballot in accordance with our Bylaws, Article Ten: Elections, Section 3: Ballots (Bylaws can be found in your copy of the Resource Manual and Directory (RM&D). Results of the new members of the board will be published in 'Nouncements, on our website, and of course, recognized at the Installation Ceremony at Convention.

MetroAccess operates 7 days a week, 365 days a year, providing service within a three-quarter mile corridor around existing fixed-route services such as Metrobus, Metrorail, and jurisdictional bus services, at least during all hours of operation that service is operated on these modes.

MetroAccess fares are two times the fastest comparable fixed-route fare, with a maximum fare of \$6.50. The lowest available fare 15 minutes before and 15 minutes after the requested pick-up time will be provided during the booking process. Customers are required to pay the fare to the driver prior to boarding the vehicle.

You have your honorable discharge certificate and your DD214, but your platoon photo and platoon book are just as important as is any picture of you in uniform. Marines can call MCRD Parris Island Recruit Photo at 843-228-1555 and get a copy of their platoon photo. However, there is no way to order a replacement platoon book.

In the front of the book there are photos of every phase of training. In the back of the book are individual photos of the women that you trained with, formed a bond with and of the Marines in the chain of command that trained you. Most books include the first names of recruits which help locate platoon mates.

Valerie Shields Breidenbaugh, WMA History & Document Curator, has digitized more than 600 platoon books and counting! She also posts her scanned platoon books onto put WMA Shutterfly page and to YellowFootPrints.com. She has had dozens of women email her copies of their platoon books and in turn Valerie has emailed copies to female Marines...far too many to count! What began as a hobby is now her passion. "I so enjoy helping women Marines receive a piece of their personal Marine Corps history" says Valerie.

Chaplain's Corner

The close of 2017 brought an end to a woman Marine legend, Master Sergeant Catherine Murray, USMC, Ret. Catherine was the first woman Marine to become part of the Fleet Marine Reserve Force; the first woman Marine to retire from the Marine Corps. She lived all of her 100 years exemplifying our core values: honor, courage, commitment. She was committed to telling the



story of her service in the Marine Corps, as evidenced by the many nuggets found on social media. She continued to serve as a hospital volunteer for many years, giving enough hours to equal several years. She faced her declining health with courage and grace, never complaining about what she couldn't do, but excited about what she could still do! I pray I can be as positive an influence in the years to come as she was. Fair winds and following seas, dear lady, your tour of duty is complete.

In the course of my duties I am informed of many Woman Marine deaths of non-members. One in particular, touched me deeply and I mourn that we all did not have the pleasure of knowing her: Christine Strain died peacefully in her sleep early in the morning of December 5, 2017 in Camarillo, CA. She had been alert and active until her recent decline. Her three beloved caregivers, Mitch, Bona, and Norma had been taking turns staying with her night and day - holding her hand, lying next to her, singing her favorite songs, always bringing a smile to her face with their loving ways.

A naturalized citizen, born nearly a century ago in the UK, Christine Strain had a deeply-instilled appreciation of our American democracy. She recognized the value of public education and was herself a lifelong learner. After graduating from Hollywood High, she attended UCLA and Columbia, graduating with a degree in history.

During WWII, she enlisted in the Marines and taught celestial navigation to the young recruits. Continuing as an educator, she became a high school-level US history instructor. Eventually, she became a girls' vice principal and principal in the L.A. City Schools.

She returned to her passion of teaching young adults about the value of our constitution when she retired and became a docent for the Superior Court of Ventura County. She read three newspapers each morning, always watched Washington Week in Review, never missed voting day, and proudly displayed the American flag on patriotic holidays. Christine donated funds to Democratic candidates, especially women, all of her adult life.

As a little girl, her father would pay her a penny a word if she could memorize an entire poem without making a mistake, and so her love and knowledge of poetry began. Even in her late nineties, she could offer inspiration with a few choice lines of classic verse. Christine also loved to sing and often began the day with one of her favorite songs. Additionally, she was an accomplished flute and piano player, and for years, while living in Pacific Palisades, played flute with the Palisades Symphony.

In her twenties, Christine had the opportunity to shake Eleanor Roosevelt's hand when the first lady visited Hollywood. She had a different kind of celebrity encounter when she was chosen to compete on the radio version of You Bet Your Life. She won enough money to buy her first car and later turned Groucho down when he called and asked her for a date!

A natural teacher, Christine was always eager to lend a hand. At 98, Christine gave piano lessons to Carlo, Bona's son, and helped her cherished companions with their English skills.

Up until a few weeks before she died, she took great pleasure visiting the public library. From Stephen Hawking's books on theoretical physics to Garfield comics, she loved to read. Among other daily pastimes (past and present) were practicing Tai Chi, walking, doing double acrostics, knitting beautiful sweaters, gardening, and listening to classical music.

Christine lived an exemplary life. She was disciplined and brave, devoted to God and her county, and supportive of worthy causes worldwide. Not only did she remain spry and healthy for just short of a hundred years, she was always the smartest one in the room, any room, right up until the end. A+, indeed!

We miss you and will carry you in our hearts forever. "Heaven's morning breaks and earth's vain shadows flee; in life, in death, O Lord, abide with me."



Out with the old and in with the new! What did OR-1 do last year? Well to start with, we added seven new members to our chapter. But we're not done for 2017, Our Annual Tovs-4-Tots Christmas Luncheon was a success held at Jacqueline Caputi's home.

The last and most important event of 2017 was OR-1 wishing Dolly Ruble Yandle a Happy 95th Birthday! Born on December 24, 1922, this WWII woman Marine heard the call when our country needed women to "Free A Man to Fight!"

Dolly recounts her time in the Corps:

It was a warm morning when I walked into the Navy and Marine Corps Recruiting office on Pine near Wall Street in

Manhattan, NY on March 17, 1943. My boyfriend (later to be my husband), Bob Ruble, was an aircraft mechanic in the Army Air Corps stationed at Mitchell Field based on Long Island. He was soon to be shipped overseas and I decided to join the military to do my part to help our country by enlisting as a WAVE. While waiting for the Navy recruiter, I saw a poster of the newly formed Women Marine Corps and thought, 'That's one smart uniform!' The Marine recruiter

came out of his office first. I filled out the paperwork, was interviewed, and sworn in as a United States Marine by noon.

I arrived for boot camp at Hunter College in New York City on May 1. The WAVES lived in the first six floors of the building and women Marines on the seventh. We got some of our physical expertise by running up and down the stairs several times a day. Boot camp was a month long. We were kept very busy but had time to meet many wonderful women. We marched and marched everywhere! We finally graduated, and I went by train to Bloomington, IN. Prior to my enlistment, I worked for the NY Telephone Company for several years and thought the Corps would use my experience as a telephone operator. Instead, I was sent to the University of Indiana to start



Storekeeper School where I learned about disbursing payroll, quarter mastering, inventory, and all kinds of record keeping.

My first post was at MCAS Cherry Point, NC. There were several outposts that watched for German subs along the coast line and river that was close to the base. Cherry Point had barracks for women and it was a pleasant place to live. On the weekends, some of the women would go into town on

the bus but many stayed behind and went to the beach or wrote letters to their boyfriends in the military. I wrote many letters to Bob. I had no idea where he was.

In 1945, I was transferred to Philadelphia Naval Air Supply. There wasn't a barracks for women, so I lived in a room at a private residence near the base. My days were spent typing orders for airplane parts to be shipped overseas. I knew how important it was to be accurate in my typing. The safety of the plane and men depended on me to order the correct part. I ate my meals on base or at a restaurant. Sometimes on the weekends, I would go home to my mother on Long Island. I missed my friends at Cherry Point and I missed Bob.

The war in Europe was coming to an end but still had some action in the Pacific. We were all hopeful that the war would soon be over on both fronts and our loved ones come home safelv.

I had enough points and was discharged from the Marine Corps on September 19. While somewhat sad at leaving the

Corps, I was also happy to finally make plans with Bob who safely returned from CBI (China, Burma, and India) duty and discharged from the U.S. Army Air Corps.

Bob and I were married on October 28, 1945. We headed west in a 1937 brown Packard and made it all the 2017 Christmas Luncheon, back row (1-r): Jacqueina area of small manu-

factured homes reserved for returning veterans. We started our family and had four children. I joined the Portland American Legion Post #1 in the early 1950s. I was a member of the first all women color guard in Oregon. We marched in the Rose Festival Parade and several other local activities. We were as good as the famous Rockettes in precise marching and fashion!

WMA OR-1 was formed by many members of Post #1, including me, in 1964. We became a large group so Meg Dawes suggested we start a newsletter to keep each other informed of the chapter activities. My job was to compile and help keep current, the names and addresses of members, type the newsletter, and roll it up for mailing. This humble newsletter later became WMA 'Nouncements, still used with the same purpose...to keep members informed of activities.
